Nancy Breth student wins Eastman Competition

Nancy Breth's student, Brian Le, won first prize in the Eastman Young Artists International Piano Competition in July in Rochester, N Y

As top winner among 22 competitors from eight countries, Brian was awarded the Gold Medal, \$10,000 cash, a full tuition scholarship to the Eastman School of Music and a New York City concert debut on October 10, 2015, in the DiMenna Center Piano Concert Series.

To get ready for his New York concert, Brian will play a recital on September 26, at 2 p.m., at Steinway Gallery, 11611 Old Georgetown Rd, North Bethesda.

His program includes a Bach Prelude and Fugue, Beethoven Opus 109 complete, Bartok Sonata complete, Chopin Ballade No. 4, Ravel Ondine and selected short pieces by Rachmaninoff, Bolcom and Chopin.

Brian's reaction to his victory and the competition:



"First of all, it was great to be with several of my friends that I had met at other music festivals and competitions. Also, listening to the other participants practice and perform and being able to experience firsthand their dedication and talent was just so inspiring. The competition field was tough and obviously with such a high level of playing, the jury decision was very subjective. Winning the competition was a plus, but also being able to perform in Kodak Hall with the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra was simply an unforgettable experience."

To Nancy it was more like shock. Before the competition she and Brian thought "the prize would simply be the fact of acceptance" into this "forbidding" group. Not until afterwards did she even know what was included in the first prize.

I went online and looked and then I nearly passed out," she said. "I had to contact Brian, just to be sure I wasn't dreaming. No, I wasn't. So yes, it is true, but still absolutely amazing."

Brian won the last round of the competition with the Allegro maestoso movement of Chopin's Concerto No. 1 in e minor. He performed with the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra conducted by Neil Varon.

Brian lives in Silver Spring and is a senior in the IB program at Montgomery/Blair High School. His parents are Joanne Zhang and Charles Le.

The DiMenna Concert Series, according to its website, is "a new concert series devoted solely to Distinguished Classical Pianists." Enrique Graf, Agustin Anievas and Jeffrey Biegel are among the artists who have recently performed there.

programs. A complimentary lunch will be provided. I would especially encourage our new members to come and become familiar with our pro-


grams and meet other WMTA members.

Hartman Piano Awards

Viola Hartman served as the WMTA President from 1961-1963. Named in her honor, the Viola M. Hartman Piano Performance Awards has been one of the longest running and most important WMTA competitions, attracting as many as 175 competitors at the pre-college

The Hartman Awards consistently attracts a high level of competitors of all ages, from 6-7 year-old pianists through 17-18 year-old performers, many of whom aspire to pursue further musical studies at the college level. Due to the large volume of entrants the competition lasts an entire day.

Each student is required to perform two contrasting pieces and time limits are carefully observed in performance. This event is held in recital format, giving students an opportunity to listen to and learn from one

Anthony Chanaka Classical Festival

The Anthony Chanaka Classical Festival was created to honor the memory of our longtime WMTA member and treasurer.

This event alternates years with the Baroque Festival and will be held March 12, 2016.

Students will perform at Steinway Recital Hall, 11611 Old Georgetown Road, North Bethesda. The venue has a slightly raised stage and a Steinway Grand is available for the pianists. There is ample space for performers, family and friends. I have received complimentary comments from many parents who find the atmosphere warm and friendly. Two judges offer supportive comments that encourage students to continue with their development and gentle criticism to enhance their performance.

The Anthony Chanaka Classical Festival is a non-competitive event held in recital format. Students are assigned to a recital group and are required to stay for the entire recital. All performers receive two critiques and a certificate of participation. This event is open to all instrumental and voice students through the 12th grade.

The repertoire includes any solo or ensemble music written by a composer of the Classical period (born between 1720 and 1800). Each movement of a sonata or sonatina is considered to be one piece. Pianists may not program simplified arrangements and no method book pieces are allowed. Bowed string, wind and brass instrument arrangements and transcriptions are permitted at the elementary level only. Guitar arrangements and transcriptions are permitted at all levels. Piano solo works must be performed by memory. All others may use a score. Students must provide the judges with scores of their pieces.

Application fee: \$20 -- per student or ensemble Postmark deadline: February 13, 2016

Time Limits: Each performer may play up to two pieces, limited to a total of 8 minutes.

"Learn music theory with joy and enthusiasm."

This summer, I had the opportunity to attend the week-long Music Mind Games Workshop, Unit 1, in Kensington, MD, which is run by MTNA member Michiko Yurko, thanks to a continuing education grant from MCMTA. It was an enlightening and energizing experience. The workshop was attended by teachers from Australia, Spain and several states throughout the United States. Some of the teachers had attended the workshop before but came again to learn new ideas from this everevolving program. A few were new to the program like me, but others were experienced and studying to become teacher trainers. It was a great dynamic that nurtured the neophytes and helped the experienced teachers see what games were more challenging to learn.

For those of you who do not know about *Music Mind Games*, it is a program designed to help students "learn music theory and reading skills with joy and enthusiasm". As chair of the MSMTA theory program, I have a particular interest in exploring fresh, new ways to approach the subject and this workshop did not disappoint.

Music Mind Games uses four main components in its teaching method: 1) an innovating teaching sequence; 2) a nurturing philosophy; 3) friendly, colorful materials; and 4) a large variety of creative games. There are 300 games in the curriculum, which is flexible and can be used with preschoolers but older students as well. The games are divided into nine areas: dictation and sight reading, musical alphabet and intervals, reading rhythms, rhythm math, staff and notes, tempo, music symbols, scales/key signatures, and triads/ chords. Individual games have different focus, such as teaching, memory, review, or evaluation. In addition to the theory concepts, this program helps to develop skills necessary for studying music, such as following directions, developing a quick and dependable memory, and working well in a group in a noncompetitive way among other

Personally, I plan to incorporate many of the games into my early childhood classes and with my piano students in both my group and private lessons. One of the innovative things I found was a new way to teach melodic dictation. I have a few students who have been struggling with dictation as they make their way through the upper theory levels. Many of the interval and dictation games covered in this workshop gave me a fresh perspective on how to work with those students and improve their listening skills. In addition, I think Michiko's unique way of teaching rhythm through the "Blue Jello" vocabulary that assigns words to various rhythms could make rhythmic dictation a fun game instead of the sometimes terrifying and tedious exercise some of my students consider it

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A message from WMTA's membership chair:

WMTA was lauded by the MTNA last year for its membership retention efforts, and we'd like to keep up the good work! Novik Concerto Competition

The Ylda Novik Memorial Concerto Competition for Pianists will take place on March 19-20, 2016. The Junior Division is open to students through 9th grade.

The Senior Division is open to students 19 or younger enrolled in any high school, junior high school or elementary school in the Washington area. First place winners from 2014 are ineligible to compete in the same division.

Repertoire Requirements:

Junior Division: Any one movement from any concerto

Senior Division: An entire concerto, except Beethoven #3 and Prokofieff #3.

Awards:

The Senior Division winner will be awarded a cash prize and a performance of the winning concerto with the Capital City Symphony Orchestra. The second place winner will receive a monetary prize. Honorable mentions may be awarded. The Junior Division winner will be awarded a monetary prize.

2014 Senior Division winner, Eric Lin, student of Marjorie Lee, performed the Prokofieff 3rd Concerto with the Capital City Symphony on October 12, 2014 as a result of winning first place in the last competition.

This concerto competition is named for Ylda Novik (1922-1977), former WMTA President from 1965-1967. As a teacher, editor, author, scholar, mentor and friend, she was highly respected not only in the Washington community but in the wider world of music

This biennial competition is held in audition format, according to a Charter that was adopted by the WMTA board in 1980. Held on two days, the Junior Division requires a concerto movement, while Senior Division competitors have to prepare an entire concerto.
